



Scarf Tying Instructions for Square Scarves

Before you style 🧗


The first step when tying most square scarf designs is to fold the scarf into a perfect triangle. This can be achieved by connecting diagonal end A to diagonal end B, as shown.





The Rosette

With the folded face of the scarf to your forehead, place the scarf on your head, position and gather all loose ends.

Twist the ends in a spiral, as shown. After you have twisted the ends, start to create a spiral bun that will form your Rosette.






To secure Rosette, tuck the loose ends into the folds of the Rosette or secure with a pin or a scrunchie.



Basic Tie




With the folded face of the scarf to your forehead, place the scarf on your head and position as shown below.






Overlap the ends of the scarf to crisscross each end as shown. Securely tie the ends into a knot.






For diverse options, a bow can be tied from the knot.




The bow or knot can be worn to the side or to the back of the head.

Turban Tie with Rosette




With the folded face at the nape of your neck, place scarf on your head. Carefully position the scarf and tie a knot in the center of your forehead.





After tying a knot in the middle of your forehead with the scarf, twist the ends as shown. Carefully form your Rosette by creating a spiral bun.

Useful Style Tip

Our scarf pad is designed to wear underneath head scarves or headwear to add height and volume, for a more flattering appearance. It helps to grip your scarf in place and eliminates slippage as you are tying it.
